

From the Litter Box





In Jaguars early years, after the war, the marque was tied to racing. The XK120 was the fastest production car in the world. All the up and coming race car drivers and wannabes drove an XK120. In the early years the grids were full of them. Sometimes there were Jag only grids. Guys that raced MG's, and wanted to go faster, upgraded to an XK 120. But what about someone who was already racing an XK 120 and could not afford or get their hands on a C-Type? American ingenuity... Build your own.

Many of the cars became modified. Some people, like John Fitch, used running gear and created a smaller more streamlined body. Then there were those that just wanted that glorious XK engine to put in their own creation. One of those was Milwaukee's own Brooks Stevens Excalibur J race car. He built three of them between 1953 and 1954. Only the last car was eventually upgraded to the new XK140 C head engine. Brooks also did design work McCulloch. They had a n add on supercharger kit for the XK engine. The car raced in C modified without the supercharger and B modified with it. In C modified it ran against the factory Jaguars and Ferraris. They eventually decided to stay in B modified. By 1957 they had changed the body of the car and upgraded to a huge 371 truck supercharger. They struggled in 1957. By 1958 they got things dialed in. The car was on the front row for

the 1958 Road America 500; next to a Chevy powered Ferrari. It won its class and won the B modified championship that year. A great accomplishment for a one off Jag powered special.

Brooks son David drag raced the car in 1959 and had fast time of the day at 12.5 in a quarter mile. By The time summer was over it had a twisted frame. The car got a new frame, a more streamlined body and a new engine. It was going racing again. The supercharged 3 ½ liter Jag motor was replaced with a fuel injected, stroked, Lincoln engine that was 1 cubic inch under the 8 liter limit for B modified. 

DID - U - KNOW

The Austin 7 was a very popular economy car in the United Kingdom from 1923 to 1939. Beginning in 1926 it was available with the choice of a fabric body for coachwork. Yes, you read that correctly, the body of the car was cloth. Charles Weymann, a Nieuport test pilot developed the process, and for about a decade it was a very popular option.

Why would fabric be considered a good choice for a car body? Metal bodies of that era produced plenty of drumming, squeaks, and rattles. The cloth body was silent, light weight, and cheap. Also, one has to remember fabric was the best choice for aircraft construction of that time. It's not much of a stretch to think if it's a good way to build an airplane it's certainly good enough for a motorcar. So popular was this idea, Weymann sold the license for his method to 123 companies worldwide including: Austin, Morris, Bentley, MG, Rolls-Royce, Rover, Sunbeam, Invicta, and Lagonda. Each of them used his process to build fabric bodies for various models.

Fast forward 100 years and today the market for electric vehicles is growing. Range however is the Achilles heel, and the most common solution is to have bigger or better batteries. But wait! What would Colin Chapman say the solution was? Yes, to save weight. Enter the BMW Gina concept, a fabric-skinned sports car. BMW claims it is elastic, water resistant, durable, and of course light. Was Charles Weymann ahead of his time? Perhaps. Or perhaps the problems he solved have simply changed, and new technology might give fabric a second chance.


