#### MG, PRELUDE TO THE T

Production of the MG TC began in 1945. Although it was little more than a refreshed version of a prewar model, its influence to MG and to the entire British motor industry cannot be overstated. WWII had just ended and homeward bound GIs introduced the new concept of a "sports car" to the United States. But before we examine the TC it is appropriate to briefly look back at the history of MG leading up to the formation of the T Series.

Morris Garages was an automobile dealership founded in 1909 by William R. Morris. As was typical at that time the business also specialized in customizing automobile coachwork. In 1921 Morris Garages hired a young motorcar racing enthusiast named Cecil Kimber as its sales manager. Kimber quickly displayed his talent for design and in 1923 was promoted to general manager.

He developed "sporty" coachwork for the Morris Oxford which was advertised in November 1923 as the Super Sports Morris MG. This was the first use of those two letters in the octagon creating the now famous marque. Kimber felt the key to success was racing so he worked at building lighter bodied versions of automobiles to enter into competition. His formula for success proved to be a sound one and in 1928 the M.G. Car Company was founded, specializing in the production of sports cars. MG enjoyed competition success under Kimber's leadership beating Austin to the 100mph mark in the 750cc class and 200mph mark with the K3 Magnette.

Innovation and growth were the hallmark of MG with Kimber at the helm, which made it all the more shocking when William Morris sold the MG Car Company in 1935. Kimber was instructed that Abington was to return higher profits, and toward that goal the racing program would terminate immediately. In addition, the production of the very successful Wolseley based overhead cam engines would end, building of the PA/PB and Magnette models would stop, and the MG design office would close. The new management was only interested in profitability which was to be achieved through simplicity and uniformity of parts.

A new car was to be designed using the Morris 10 pushrod engine for power. Understandably Kimber was quite taken aback by all of the drastic changes and the onerous restrictions placed before him. Yet the outcome of this upheaval resulted in the birth of the last of the traditional MG sports cars, the T series.
